f. 43: Alfred. Throughout, the narrative is in sections, one devoted to each king.

f. 54: William I.

Continues to 14 Henry VI (1436) and ends unfinished with the assassination of James I of Scotland:

In cuius rei euidentiam quidam legatus apostolicus in scocia tunc existens dictam camisiam

postmodum domino pape ut dicitur deferebat. Sic ergo omnipotenti deo laus digne attribuitur a populo  
anglicano qui sua gracia sibi sepius suos suppeditat inimicos.
