Unsolicited manuscripts will not normally be returned unless accompanied by a stamped addressed envelope, or International Postal Coupons. Manuscripts should be clearly typed, double-spaced, and follow the format of this issue. Illustrations should be A4 (210 x 297 mm) for reduction to A5 (148 x 210 mm). ARC has a policy of the non-sexist use of language and contributors are requested to conform to this policy. The editors are most willing to assist with any enquiries which may arise on this point.
